SUBJECT: Reclassification

The Putnam County District Attorney's Office is requesting salary increases for two budget lines as follows:

First, salary line 116510115 is currently a part-time Assistant District Attorney position with a salary of \$65,294. In the 2024 budget, \$19,706 was earmarked to be used if and when this position became vacant (see line 116510999) to transition this to a full-time position at an entry level Assistant District Attorney salary of \$85,000. Based upon the needs of the office that have been previously discussed and will further be outlined at the legislative meeting, the District Attorney is requesting an additional \$45,000 for salary line 116510115, bringing the salary to \$130,000, with the intent to hire an experienced full-time Appellate Attorney to fill the vacant position.

Second, the Personnel Department recently conducted a job analysis review of line 116510105 which is currently a full-time Assistant District Attorney position within our department. The review was initiated on May 28, 2024, and after all information was considered, the Personnel Department concluded that the position should be properly titled "Asisstant District Attorney – Bureau Chief." This change in classification is accompanied by a request for a salary increase of \$22,112, increasing the current salary of \$107,888 to \$130,000.

The salary increases and the change in classification will be covered by the Discovery Grant funds in 10115400 430890. The District Attorney is requesting that the re-classification for position 116510105 take place immediately and the salary increase be retroactive to January 1, 2024. The salary increase for the newly-created full-time Appellate Attorney position will take effect upon the hiring of a qualified candidate.

Please refer this request to the Personnel committee for their review. A budgetary transfer will be provided by the Finance Department under separate cover.

Thank you for your consideration of this request. The District Attorney intends to address these requests at the personnel committee meeting scheduled for July 9, 2024, and is open to any questions at any time.



Lab Analysis: Fund the Tuberculosis (TB) Lab Analysis Line. We currently have two patients with active TB – one is being treated through July 2024, and the other will be treated into early 2025. Patients with active TB are required to go for monthly chest x-rays, CAT scans, and bloodwork as part of their treatment, which can last anywhere from six to nine months. One elderly patient has not responded to treatment and needed to restart a nine-month regimen in Spring 2024. We also treat patients with latent TB infection (LTBI, also known as "sleeping TB", as the germs are present but inactive), they are sent for a chest x-ray and blood work. On average, we treat one to five LTBI patients each month.

Co-Pay: Fund the TB Co-Pay Line. We currently have over \$6,500.00 in patient bills to pay and are expecting another hospital bill for a patient who was treated for a TB-related illness earlier this year.



Dear County Executive Byrne,

The purpose of this letter is to provide you with an update regarding the \$2 Million appropriation and allocation of ARPA funding to the Sheriff's Office. I am requesting a funding source change that I believe most efficiently uses the funding, meets my Office's goals, and will be beneficial for the County.

The Sheriff's Office was given oversight of \$2 Million of the County's ARPA funding for School Safety - Infrastructure Upgrades pursuant to Resolution #135 of 2022. The initial intent of the ARPA funding was to provide an opportunity for my Office to work collaboratively with the County's schools to identify and fund various school safety and infrastructure improvements. However, the full development and completion of the school projects currently contemplated will not likely meet the ARPA compliance deadlines because of delayed responses from vendors and manufacturers.

We have a revised plan for how we would like to allocate the entire \$2 Million and will need your cooperation to do so. In the 2024 Capital Budget, the Legislature authorized three projects that are critically important to the Putnam County Sheriff's Office and Correctional Facility: Boiler replacements -\$700,000; Perimeter Security Improvements- \$125,000; and Life Safety Systems Modernization -\$850,000. Attached is a brief explanation of each project as originally presented for consideration. I have discussed the timing of these Capital Projects with DPW, Purchasing, and Finance and they are on schedule to be completed within the timeline required for ARPA compliance.

Therefore, I am asking that \$1 Million of ARPA funding earmarked for School Safety and Infrastructure projects be equally exchanged with the Sheriff's Office facility Capital Projects general fund sources. We will be able to continue to explore the originally planned school safety projects, but without the ARPA timing constraints. Finally, the remaining \$1 Million in ARPA funds can then be used to pursue additional projects that support our County's school children.

Thank you for your anticipated support in this matter.

Sheriff's Department/ Correctional Facility - Various Capital Projects (2024)

- Sheriff's Department Boiler Replacements (current est. \$700,000) Putnam County is requesting funding for the replacement of the existing hot water boilers serving the Putnam County Sheriff's Department and Correctional Facility located in Carmel, NY. The County has conducted an existing conditions assessment to develop a scope of work. A consulting engineering firm has been contracted to develop plans and specifications for a public bid.
- 2) Sheriff's Department Perimeter Security Improvements (\$125,000) To replace the existing Correctional Facility gate with a new, functional automatic gate to allow for access through the lower lot area. This gate has not been operational for quite some time and is in dire need of replacement.
- 3) Sheriff's Department Life Safety Systems Modernization (\$850,000) Upgrades to the two existing fire alarm systems (Fire Alarm and Lighting Control) and intercom system which are severely outdated and no longer compatible with modern replacement parts rendering certain elements obsolete.

During April 2024, the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board (PCAFPB) received nine (9) applications for inclusion into the Putnam County Agricultural District. Application review and site visits were conducted during the month of May 2024. On May 29, 2024, the PC AFPB voted on the applications. All eleven (11) voting members were present. The results are as follows:

1.

Town of Kent; 169 Dean Road. Robert Lena / Angry Goose Farm -Parcel #10.-2-6.-1 (115.26 acres) -Parcel #10.-1-38.-1 (39.66 acres): Total Acreage: 154.92

Applicant seeks inclusion as a commercial horse boarding operation.

In 2001 the Agriculture and Markets Law (AML) was amended to include commercial horse boarding operations in the definition of a "farm operation" under AML §301(11). This amendment recognized that commercial horse boarding operations are farm operations and as such should receive AML §305(a) protection from unreasonably restrictive local laws. In 2011 AML §301(11) was amended to include commercial equine operations in the definition of a "farm operation."

Both parcels in this application are subject to an easement by the DEP that prevented the board from recommending inclusion in the agricultural district.

Under AML §301(13) the term "commercial horse boarding operation" is defined as "...an agricultural enterprise, consisting of at least seven acres and boarding at least ten horses."

The parcels seeking to be included in the Agricultural district are subject to 'The City of New York Department of Environmental Protection Conservation Easement Deed' dated October 19, 2001, between (former owner) Michael and Rosemary Fossati and The City of New York. The present owner / applicant took the property subject to this easement.

§3.4(B) of this document limits the allowable number of 'horses or other livestock' to 6 (six).

Given this conflict between the conditions of the easement and the requirements of AML§301, the AFPB voted to not recommend this application for inclusion to the Agricultural District.

(x) The PCAFPB voted (0 yes; 11 no) to not recommend this parcel for inclusion in 2024.

Town of Putnam Valley; Rush Drive. Frank Rush -Parcel #83.20-1-6 (33 acres)

Total acreage: 33

Applicant Frank Rush seeks inclusion in the Putnam County Agricultural District as a Christmas tree farm.

NYS Article 25AA - Agricultural Districts, Section 303-b requires the county agricultural and farmland protection board develop recommendations as to whether the land that has petitioned to be included in the agricultural district consists of predominantly of "viable agricultural land" and the inclusion of such land would serve the public interest by assisting in maintaining a viable agricultural industry within the district.

Under Putnam County Legislature Resolution #139 (July 12,2007), one of the factors to be considered when determining the 'viability' of the parcel(s) is, "Are the parcels currently being farmed".

In reviewing Parcel # 83.20-1-6, the Putnam County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board felt the property showed potential as a Christmas tree farm but had not been sufficiently developed for inclusion into the Agricultural district.

Due to the requirements stated above the PCAFPB does not recommend the property for inclusion into the Putnam County Agricultural District .

(x) The PCAFPB voted (3 yes, 8 no) to not recommend this parcel for inclusion in 2024.

3. Town of Patterson; 276 Quaker Road Daniel Honovich / Ridge Ranch -Parcel # 15.-1-46 (68.04 acres) -Parcel # 15.-1-49 (45.03 acres) -Parcel # 15.1-48 (.45) Total acreage: 113.52

Applicants are operating a breeding program for Scottish Highland breeds and crosses, donkeys, goats, and rabbits.

Under Putnam County Legislature Resolution #139 (July 12,2007), one of the factors to be considered when considering the inclusion of a parcel into the Agricultural District 'Each Parcel must be free and clear of Town, State and Federal violations.'

The applicant currently has an outstanding violation with the Town of Patterson. The application was not voted on.

(x) The PCAFPB did not vote on this application and does not recommend inclusion in the Agricultural District.

4. Town of Carmel, 241 Washington Road Eric Hadbrouck / Kascade Enterprises -Parcel # 54.-1-36

Total acreage: 28.32 acres

Applicant seeks inclusion as a commercial horse boarding operation.

A majority of the board supported the application siting a use consistent with the neighboring parcel(s) and the reputation of the applicant.

Other members of the board cited concerns over the absence of existing infrastructure or horse boarding activity.

(+) The PCAFPB voted (6 yes, 5 no) to recommend this parcel for inclusion in 2024.

Applicant seeks inclusion to the Agricultural District as a farm raising 'free range pasture raised protein.' The application has two parcels, one in Patterson and one in Southeast.

Under Putnam County Legislature Resolution #139 (July 12,2007), the 'agricultural viability' of the parcel is gauged by several factors. (see page 2 of the resolution)

Here the board felt that the parcels "Are currently being farmed" and were satisfied that the farm operations were 'following agricultural best management practices.'

Opposition to the application was based primarily on the (Resolution #139) consideration that the parcel was 'adjacent to a sensitive natural resource' without a storm water protection plan on file. This was a reference to the parcel containing a class 'c' stream tributary to the Bog Brook Reservoir.

(+) The PCAFPB voted (9 yes. 2 no) to recommend both parcels for inclusion in 2024.

6. Town of Putnam Valley, 221 Oscawanna Lake Rd. Joey Mancuso / Big Red Barn Farm -Parcel # 72.16-1-1 (67.05 acres) Total acreage: 67.05

Applicant seeks inclusion as a commercial horse boarding operation.

The board was generally supportive of the application citing use consistent with the previous owner and the neighboring parcels and having demonstrated an adequate boarding capacity of ten (10) horses.

Questions were raised about the proposed development being inconsistent with existing zoning laws and inadequate turn – out area for the horses. There were 3 horses being boarded at the time of the site visit.

(+) The PCAFPB voted (9 yes, 2 no) to recommend both parcels for inclusion in 2024.

7. Town of Patterson, 550 Route 164. Shannon & Eric Nitti / Hidden Hope Farm -Parcel #24.-1-62 (18.61 acres) Total acreage: 18.61

Applicant seeks inclusion with a combination of agricultural activities including vegetable gardening, orchards, horticulture, and beekeeping.

Under Resolution #139 (1st bullet point), one of the factors to be considered when determining the 'viability' of the parcel(s) is, "Are the parcels currently being farmed".

The parcel contains a working garden area however much of the property has yet to be developed. The majority voted the property was not sufficiently developed for inclusion in the agricultural district.

Citing Resolution #139 (2^{nd} bullet point) other board members felt the enterprise qualified as a start- up farm and should be recommended for inclusion.

(x) The PCAFPB voted (4 yes, 7 no) to not recommend both parcels for inclusion in 2024.

8. Town of Patterson, 187 Tammany Hall Road Peter Clarke / Mother Farm Parcel #34.-3-1.41 (15.5 acres) Total acreage: 15.5

Applicant seeks inclusion as a tree farm. The business plan stating the applicant is growing seedling out to larger trees and supplying them to clients.

The area identified in the application for the grow operation was 3 acres. Under AML Art.25AA §301(4) 'land used in agricultural production' means an area of not less than seven (7) acres of land used for the preceding two (2) years for the production for sale of crops.

A majority of board members felt the area was too small to be considered 'viable agricultural land' and that it lacked adequate scale to be included in the agricultural district.

Some board members felt the scale was sufficient.

(x) The PCAFPB voted (4 yes, 7 no) to not recommend this parcel for inclusion in 2024.

During April 2024, the Putnam County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board (PCAFPB) received nine (9) applications for inclusion into the Putnam County Agricultural District. Application review and site visits were conducted during the month of May 2024. On May 29, 2024, the PC AFPB voted on the applications.

At that time, application #3 submitted by Honovich / Ridge Ranch of 276 Quaker Road was not voted on and not recommended for inclusion due to an outstanding violation with the Town of Patterson.

Under Putnam County Legislature Resolution #139 (July 12,2007), one of the factors to be considered when considering the inclusion of a parcel into the Agricultural District is 'Each Parcel must be free and clear of Town, State and Federal violations.'

On June 20, 2024, notice was received from the Town of Patterson that the violation had been lifted. On June 26, 2024, the Putnam County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board held a regular meeting and voted on the Honovich / Ridge Ranch application. The results are offered here as an update to the original memorandum.

For evening care the horses are brought back to their stall fed grain, hay and water. Blanketing will be provided as needed. Stephanie will also ensure that each horse is of a sound nature and will report any concerns to the clients in a prompt manner.

The paddocks and arenas will be groomed and maintained by Stephanie on a daily basis. Any additional maintenance or repairs will be the responsibility of the owner, Joey Mancuso. The Putnam County Department of Public Works is requesting the consideration of the repurposing of the Farmers Mills Road (8757.67) Bridge Project funds to the Fair St. Reconstruction Project (8756.09). Currently, and as indicated on the most recent TIP, the Farmers Mills Rd. Project includes \$551,000 for DETLDES/PRELDES/ROWINCD obligating this FFY, \$138,000 for ROWACQU obligating in FFY 2025 and \$4.793M for CONST/CONINSP obligating in FFY 2026. After thorough evaluation and consideration of alternative immediate needs, the Department feels as if the Farmers Mills Rd. Bridge is not of immediate nor short term concern. The bridge currently lacks any significant visible structural deficiencies and has not been flagged by NYSDOT Inspectors as of now.

The Fair St. Reconstruction Project is scheduled to be let this Spring/Summer with \$24.705M obligated for CONST & CONINSP this FFY. Due to the industry-wide construction market trend increases since the last estimate and programming of funds, the Department anticipates a potential shortfall upon opening of bids. To avoid any delays associated with the potential for a funding shortfall and subsequent impacts to the project schedule, we feel as if the Farmers Mills funds would be better utilized if they were to be repurposed to the Fair St. Reconstruction Project.

We respectfully request your consideration for the reappropriation of funds as outlined above.



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

I. INTRODUCTION

The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) seeks applications from law enforcement agencies to fund law enforcement technologies (LETECH) and applicable software/equipment – such as license plate readers, mobile and fixed surveillance cameras, unmanned aerial vehicles, gunshot detection devices, smart equipment for patrol vehicles and officers, technology or software and other kinds of public safety equipment – to help keep New Yorkers and our law enforcement partners safe. Approximately (fifty million dollars) \$50,000,000 is expected to be available to fund LETECH and applicable equipment/ software for local law enforcement agencies outside of New York City.

Law enforcement technology is intended to help local law enforcement agencies prevent and solve crimes, particularly violent crimes by firearms and crimes of community concern (e.g., motor vehicle thefts). As well as serve as an integrated part of an agency's problem-solving and community-engagement strategy, helping to increase public trust and communication.

DCJS enhances public safety by providing resources and services that inform decision making and improve the quality of the criminal justice system. DCJS is a multi-function criminal justice support agency with a variety of responsibilities, including collection and analysis of statewide crime data; operation of the DNA databank and criminal fingerprint files; administration of federal and state criminal justice funds; identifying and funding programs that reduce crime, recidivism, and victimization. Additionally, DCJS administers the state's Sex Offender Registry. DCJS conducts research on critical criminal justice issues and provides training, legal guidance and regulation to the State's law enforcement, community corrections and prosecutorial communities.

DCJS is committed to providing programs that improve the effectiveness of New York's criminal justice system. Applications will be selected for funding consistent with the best interest of the state.

II. LAW ENFORCEMENT TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM INFORMATION

AUTHORIZATION FOR INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT WITH WESTCHESTER COUNTY TO EFFECTUATE THE INSTALLATION OF MOBILE RADIOS FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENTS PARTICIPATING IN A MUTUAL AID AND RAPID RESPONSE PLAN

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 5-G of the general Municipal Law, the County of Putnam and the County of Westchester (collectively the "Parties") created and entered into a Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan (the "Plan") to formalize operational procedures for law enforcement assistance to participating agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Plan provides that each member law enforcement agency agrees to make available its police personnel and equipment to the others upon the occurrence of a condition which is beyond the scope of its police resources; and

WHEREAS, the County of Westchester operates public safety radio communication systems for its Department of Public Safety, Department of Emergency Services, and Department of Public Works and Transportation Bee-Line transit operations; and

THIS LICENSE AGREEMENT (the "Agreement"), made the _____ day of , 2023 by and between:

THE COUNTY OF WESTCHESTER, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office and place of business in the Michaelian Office Building, 148 Martine Avenue, White Plains, New York 10601 (hereinafter referred to as the "County")

and

THE COUNTY OF PUTNAM, a municipal corporation of the State of New York having an office and place of business at 40 Gleneida Avenue, Carmel, New York 10512 (hereinafter referred to as the "Licensee").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Licensee participates in the Mutual Aid and Rapid Response Plan for the Police Departments of Westchester County, New York (the "Mutual Aid Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the County operates public safety radio communication systems (the "County Radio Systems") for the County Department of Public Safety ("DPS"), the Department of Emergency Services ("DES"), and the Department of Public Works and Transportation ("DPWT") Bee-Line transit operations, as well as for communication between the County and emergency first responders throughout Westchester County and the surrounding jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, in 2007, the County installed a control station radio and associated equipment, at the Licensee's police headquarters located at 112 Old Route 6, Carmel, New York 10512 (the "Site") for mutual aid purposes; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the County replaced the control station radio with an APX 8500 control station radio as set forth in Schedule "A" (the "Control Station Radio"), which, along with the associated and appurtenant equipment, are referred to herein as the "Radio Equipment"; and

WHEREAS, the County has obtained a Statewide Interoperable Communications Grant from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services ("NYSDHSES"), being Contract No. 197794, as may be renewed, amended or extended from time to time, a copy of which is on file with the Commissioner of the County Department of Emergency Services and available upon request (the "State Grant Agreement"), which the County wishes to use to replace the single band VHF antenna at the Site with a Sinclair SC2340 Tri-band Omni Antenna or similar antenna (the "Tri-Band Antenna) to connect the Control Station Radio to the County's P25 Trunked Radio System, which is one of the newly installed County Radio Systems; and WHEREAS, the Radio Equipment and Tri-Band Antenna are collectively referred to herein as the "Equipment";

WHEREAS, the Licensee desires to permit the installation of the Equipment according to the terms set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

<u>ARTICLE I</u> <u>GENERAL PROVISIONS</u>

Section 1.1. The recitals are hereby incorporated by reference.

<u>Section 1.2.</u> The Licensee acknowledges that the Radio Equipment was properly installed by the County and is in proper and good working condition.

Section 1.3. The County, acting by and through the Westchester County Commissioner of Department of Public Safety or his designee (the "Commissioner"), shall furnish and install the Tri-Band Antenna to replace the current single band antenna at the Site according to the terms set forth in Schedule "A".

<u>Section 1.4.</u> The Licensee agrees to provide the County with reasonable access to the Site, equipment and information necessary for the County or its vendor to install the Tri-Band Antenna.

<u>Section 1.5.</u> The Licensee acknowledges and agrees that the Equipment is intended to enhance the ability of Licensee, the County and other first responders to safely and reliably communicate with each other during mutual aid events.

<u>Section 1.6.</u> The Licensee acknowledges that the distribution, installation and use of the Tri-Band Antenna is subject to the State Grant Agreement.

<u>Section 1.7.</u> Once installed by the County, Licensee shall not uninstall, change or reassign the location or unit assignment of the Equipment without obtaining the prior written consent of the County.

<u>Section 1.8.</u> The County will furnish and install the Tri-Band Antenna at no charge to Licensee.

<u>Section 1.9.</u> The parties recognize and acknowledge that the ability of the County to furnish the Tri-Band Antenna is subject to the availability of funding and the County's receipt of funds under the State Grant Agreement. No liability shall be incurred by the County to install the Tri-Band Antenna if the County is unable to obtain such funding. It shall be within the County's sole discretion whether it installs the Tri-Band Antenna and, if it does install the Antenna, how much and what type of antenna to furnish Licensee.

If, for any reason, the full amount of said funds is not paid over or made available to the County, the County may terminate the Agreement immediately. The County shall give prompt notice of any such termination.

This Agreement is also subject to further financial analysis of the impact of any New York State Budget (the "State Budget") proposed and adopted during the term of this Agreement. The County shall retain the right, upon the occurrence of any release by the Governor of a proposed State Budget and/or the adoption of a State Budget or any amendments thereto, and for a reasonable period of time after such release(s) or adoption(s), to conduct an analysis of the impacts of any such State Budget on County finances. After such analysis, the County shall retain the right to terminate this Agreement.

<u>Section. 1.10.</u> The license granted hereunder shall include the County's officers, employees, agents, and contractors ("Permitted Persons") provided they comply with each and every term of this Agreement. The County shall be responsible to ensure that all Permitted Persons comply with each and every term of this Agreement. All Permitted Persons are neither employees of the Licensee nor under contract with the Licensee, and County alone is responsible for their work, direction, compensation and personal conduct while so engaged.

<u>Section 1.11.</u> The Licensee agrees, that after the installation of the Additional Equipment, it shall not be permitted to use the control station radio on the County Trunked Radio System until it receives written notification from the County that the Trunked Radio System is ready for use. During this time period, the F3 Radio System will still be operational and may be used by the Municipality.

ARTCILE II TERMS OF USE OF THE EQUIPMENT AND THE COUNTY RADIO SYSTEM

<u>Section 2.1.</u> The Licensee agrees that the Equipment, as well as all of the radio communication systems programmed into the Equipment, shall be used only for public safety communication and mutual aid purposes.

Section 2.2. The County hereby grants to the Licensee, its officers, employees and agents, a non-exclusive, royalty-free, personal and non-assignable license to utilize the Equipment and County Radio Systems in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. The County shall retain control and responsibility for the County Radio Systems.

Section 2.3. The parties acknowledge and agree that the County is going to obtain and hold the FCC licenses for the County Radio Systems. Licensee shall take no action that causes the County to be in violation of its FCC licenses.

<u>Section 2.4.</u> The County Radio Systems shall remain County property. It is expressly understood that this Agreement does not constitute a lease and that no ownership or property rights whatsoever are being transferred under this Agreement.

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Section 2.5. The Licensee shall be responsible for the operation, maintenance, repair, and use of the Equipment, including all costs and expenses associated thereto.

<u>Section 2.6.</u> The Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, maintain the Equipment in good working order and condition, and shall be responsible for the repair or replacement of the Equipment if damaged following the Equipment warranty period, if any.

<u>Section 2.7.</u> The County has established mandatory user guidelines and operating procedures for all users of the County Radio Systems, which the County may change and update from time to time ("User Guidelines"). The Licensee agrees to abide by the User Guidelines. If Licensee fails to abide by the User Guidelines, the Licensee acknowledges and agrees that the County may immediately disconnect, suspend or terminate the Licensee's use of the County Radio Systems. A copy of the User Guidelines will be supplied to Licensee upon its request.

Section 2.8. The Licensee shall not add any new equipment to the County Radio Systems, modify the Equipment or the County Radios Systems, or reassign the location or unit assignment of the Equipment, without the prior written consent of the County. Once approved, all of the terms of this Agreement shall apply to such new equipment, modification or reassignment.

Section 2.9. The Licensee shall ensure that only qualified persons with appropriate training utilize the Equipment. The Licensee shall ensure that all qualified persons comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations, including, those promulgated by the FCC, when utilizing the Equipment. The Licensee shall participate in any testing and training on the Equipment that may be required by the County.

<u>Section 2.10.</u> The Licensee shall maintain custody and control of the Equipment and shall not transfer custody and control of the Equipment except as provided in this Agreement.

<u>Section 2.11.</u> The County Radio Systems shall be available to the Licensee for only as long as the County, in its sole discretion, makes the County Radio Systems available. The County retains sole and absolute discretion in determining whether to continue to make the County Radio Systems available and, if so, to what person(s) and/or entity/ies, in what geographic area(s), for what purpose(s), and under what terms of use. The County may cease making the County Radio Systems available to one or more users, or all users, at any time, for any reason or no reason, either temporarily or permanently. For as long as the County Radio Systems are made available to users, each user will have access to the County Radio Systems, in their then-current form. The County in its sole discretion may change the County Radio Systems as it deems necessary and proper.

Section 2.12. The Licensee understands and acknowledges that the County has the right to reissue, remotely disable or retake possession and use of the Equipment upon notice to the Licensee. In the event the County notifies Licensee of such a reissuance, the Licensee will promptly return possession of the Equipment to the County as directed by the Commissioner.

The Licensee agrees to relinquish any claim in law or equity it may have concerning the Equipment in the event of Equipment redeployment or reissuance.

ARTICLE III EQUIPMENT PURCHASED WITH STATE GRANT FUNDS

<u>Section 3.1.</u> STATE GRANT EQUIPMENT: (a) This Article III shall apply to any Equipment paid for by the County with funds provided under the State Grant Agreement. Such Equipment for purposes of this Article III shall be referred to as the "State Grant Equipment".

(b) The Licensee agrees to comply with all terms, conditions and provisions in the State Grant Agreement applicable to the State Grant Equipment.

Section 3.2. OWNERSHIP OF STATE GRANT EQUIPMENT: The Licensee agrees that title to the State Grant Equipment shall be governed by the terms of the State Grant Agreement. The Licensee will not sell or otherwise transfer the State Grant Equipment. The Licensee agrees that the NYSDHSES retains ultimate control over and ownership of the State Grant Equipment pursuant to the terms of the State Grant Agreement. The Licensee may dispose of the State Grant Equipment only pursuant to the terms in the State Grant Agreement.

<u>Section 3.3. REPORTING</u>: The Licensee shall submit to the County Department of Emergency Services ("DES") all documentation, information or forms that DES needs in order to comply with the reporting requirements under the State Grant Agreement.

Section 3.4. NON-DISCRIMINATION REQUIREMENT: The Licensee will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed (religion), color, sex (including gender identity or expression), national origin, sexual orientation, military status, age, disability, predisposing genetic characteristic, marital status or domestic violence victim status, and shall also follow the requirements of the Human Rights Law with regard to non-discrimination on the basis of prior criminal conviction and prior arrest. The Licensee shall not by reason of race, creed, color disability, sex, or national origin: (a) discriminate in hiring against any New York State citizen who is qualified and available to perform the work; or (b) discriminate against or intimidate any employee hired for the performance of work under this Agreement.

<u>Section 3.5.</u> <u>AUDIT</u>: The Licensee will allow the NYSDHSES and/or DES to conduct periodic visits for the purposes of inspection, inventory of the Equipment and auditing the records required hereunder. This Agreement may be subject to fiscal and program audits by NYSDHSES, Office of State Comptroller, pertinent federal agencies, and other designated entities to ascertain financial compliance with federal and/or State laws, regulation, and guidelines applicable to the State Grant Agreement.

<u>ARTICLE IV</u> EQUIPMENT PURCHASED WITH BIT 32 COUNTY BOND FUNDS

Section 4.1. <u>BIT32 EQUIPMENT:</u> (a) This Article IV shall apply to Radio Equipment paid for by the County with County bond funds authorized pursuant to County Bond Act Nos. 2018-108, 2018-109, 2018-110, 2018-111, 2018-112, 2018-113, 2018-114, and 2019-115, as amended. Such Radio Equipment for purposes of this Articles IV shall be referred to as the "BIT32 Radio Equipment". In addition to the provisions in Articles I, II and V, the parties agree that the provisions in this Article IV shall apply to the BIT32 Radio Equipment.

(b) The parties acknowledge that the County entered into an agreement, dated December 27, 2018, with Motorola Solutions, Inc. ("Agreement IT- 1559") through which the County purchased the BIT32 Radio Equipment. For purposes of this Article II, the terms and conditions of Agreement IT-1559 that pertain to the use of the BIT32 Radio Equipment are hereby made a part hereof and incorporated herein by reference. A copy of Agreement IT-1559 is on file with the Chief Information Officer of the County Department of Information and Technology and the terms that pertain to the use of the BIT32 Equipment are available upon request.

Section 4.2. AUTHORIZED USER: The Licensee acknowledges and understands that through this License Agreement it is an Authorized User (as the term Authorized User is defined in Agreement IT-1559) of the BIT32 Radio Equipment. The Licensee agrees to use the BIT32 Radio Equipment in a manner that does not violate the terms of Agreement IT-1559.

<u>Section 4.3. OWNERSHIP OF RADIO EQUIPMENT</u>: Title to the BIT32 Equipment shall remain with the County unless, at the end of the Term, (a) the period of probable usefulness of the County bonds issued to finance the BIT32 Equipment, which is ten (10) years, has passed, and (b) the County has not sooner terminated the License Agreement pursuant to Section 5.4. If at the end of the Term both Section 4.3 (a) and (b) are satisfied, then title to BIT32 Equipment shall pass to the Licensee at the end of the Term.

The Licensee agrees that it will not sell or otherwise transfer custody and control of the BIT32 Equipment during the Term of the Agreement.

Section 4.4. USE OF SOFTWARE: (a) The Licensee may use the Software (as defined in Agreement IT-1559) for BIT32 Radio Equipment only for the Municipality's internal business purposes and only in accordance with the Documentation (as defined in Agreement IT-1559). Any other use of the Software is strictly prohibited. Without limiting the general nature of these restrictions, Municipality will not make the Software available for use by third parties on a "time sharing," "application service provider," or "service bureau" basis or for any other similar commercial rental or sharing arrangement.

(b) The Licensee will take reasonable efforts to ensure it and any third party under the Licensee's direction or control will not (i) reverse engineer, disassemble, peel components, decompile, reprogram or otherwise reduce the Software or any portion to a human perceptible form or otherwise attempt to recreate the source code; (ii) modify, adapt, create derivative works of, or merge the Software; (iii) copy, reproduce, distribute, lend, or lease the Software or Documentation to any third party, grant any sublicense or other rights in the Software or Documentation to any third party, or take any action that would cause the Software or Documentation to be placed in the public domain; (iv) intentionally remove, or in any way alter or obscure, any copyright notice or other notice of Motorola Solution Inc.'s proprietary rights; (v) provide, copy, transmit, disclose, divulge or make the Software or Documentation available to, or permit the use of the Software by any third party or on any machine except as expressly authorized by Agreement IT-1559; or (vi) use, or permit the use of, the Software in a manner that would result in the production of a copy of the Software solely by activating a machine containing the Software.

ARTICLE V MISCELLANEOUS

<u>Section 5.1. AUTHORIZED USE OF RADIO EQUIPMENT</u>: The Licensee agrees that the Radio Equipment shall be used for emergency response situations, such as responding to a fire, medical or other emergency, or law enforcement matters, or to fulfill mutual aid requests in accordance with applicable law.

Section 5.2. TERM: The term of this Agreement shall commence retroactively on January 1, 2007 and continue in full force and effect to the end of the useful life of the Radio Equipment and through the proper disposal of the Radio Equipment, unless the Agreement is terminated sooner as provided for in this Agreement.

<u>Section 5.3. AUDIT</u>: The Licensee will allow the County conduct periodic visits for the purposes of inspection, inventory of the Radio Equipment and auditing any records required hereunder.

Section 5.4. TERMINATION:

(a) The County on thirty (30) days notice to Licensee may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems it to be in its best interest.

(b) The Licensee on thirty (30) days notice to the County may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part when it deems it to be in its best interest.

(c) In the event the Licensee defaults in the performance of any term, condition or covenant herein contained, the County at its option and in addition to any other remedy it may have to seek damages, judicial enforcement or other lawful remedy, may terminate this Agreement upon forty-eight (48) hours written notice to the Licensee.

(d) Upon termination, all rights of the Licensee to the use of the Radio Equipment shall absolutely cease and terminate; and thereupon the Licensee shall within ten (10) days of the effective date of the termination, return the Radio Equipment to the County or the County may, by its agents, enter upon the premises where any of the Radio Equipment may be and retake possession of all or any such Radio Equipment.

<u>Section 5.5.</u> ASSIGNMENT: The Licensee shall not assign, sublet or transfer or otherwise dispose of its interest in this Agreement or the Radio Equipment without the prior written consent of the County. Any purported delegation of duties, assignment of rights or subletting of this Agreement without the prior written consent of the County is void.

<u>Section 5.6. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW:</u> The Licensee shall comply, at its own expense, with the provisions of all applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations and Executive Orders.

<u>Section 5.7.</u> INSURANCE: In connection with accessing the Site, the County agrees to self-insure liability for bodily injury and death and/or property damage under the County's self-insurance program in accordance with Local Law 6-1986 and Chapter 295 of the Laws of Westchester County. Further, if the County changes from a self-insurance program to a traditional insurance program then the County shall forward certificates of General Liability coverage naming the Licensee as an additional insured.

Section 5.8. INDEMNIFICATION:

The Licensee agrees, (a) that except for the amount, if any, of damage contributed to, caused by, or resulting from the sole negligence of the County, the Licensee shall indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, employees, agents, and elected officials from and against any and all liability, damage, claims, demands, costs, judgments, fees, attorney's fees or loss arising directly or indirectly out of the performance or failure to perform hereunder by the Licensee or third parties under the direction or control of the Licensee; and

(b) to provide defense for and defend, at its sole expense, any and all claims, demands or causes of action directly or indirectly arising out of this Agreement and to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto; and

(c) In the event the Licensee does not provide the above defense and indemnification to the County, and such refusal or denial to provide the above defense and indemnification is found to be in breach of this provision, then the Licensee shall reimburse the County's reasonable attorney's fees incurred in connection with the defense of any action, and in connection with enforcing this provision of the Agreement.

Section 5.9. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION: The Licensee expressly agrees that neither it nor any contractor, subcontractor, employee, or any other person acting on its behalf shall discriminate against or intimidate any employee or other individual on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, gender, age, national origin, ethnicity, alienage or citizenship status, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, familial status, genetic predisposition or carrier status during the term of or in connection with this Agreement, as those terms may be defined in Chapter 700 of the Laws of Westchester County. The Licensee acknowledges and understands that the County maintains a zero tolerance policy prohibiting all forms of harassment or discrimination against its employees by co-workers, supervisors, vendors, contractors, or others. <u>Section 5.10. WAIVER</u>: Failure of either party to insist, in any one or more instances, upon strict performance of any term or condition herein contained shall not be deemed a waiver or relinquishment of such term or condition, but the same shall remain in full force and effect.

<u>Section 5.11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR</u>: The Licensee is an independent contractor and shall not make any claim, demand or application to or for any right based upon any different status.

<u>Section 5.12. SEVERABILITY:</u> If any term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or void or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any such term, or provision shall be restricted in applicability or reformed to the minimum extent required for such to be enforceable. This provision shall be interpreted and enforced to give effect to the original written intent of the parties prior to the determination of such invalidity or unenforceability.

<u>Section 5.13. HEADINGS</u>: The headings in this Agreement shall be for references purposes only.

<u>Section 5.14. NOTICES</u>: All notices of any nature referred to in this Agreement shall be in writing and either sent by registered or certified mail postage pre-paid, or sent by hand or overnight courier, or sent by facsimile (with acknowledgment received and a copy of the notice sent by overnight courier), to the respective addresses set forth below or to such other addresses as the respective parties hereto may designate in writing. Notice shall be effective on the date of receipt.

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Section 5.15. ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This Agreement and its attachments constitute the entire Agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede all previous negotiations, commitments and writings. It shall not be released, discharged, changed or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each of the parties.

<u>Section 5.16. ENFORCEMENT:</u> This Agreement shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of New York. This Agreement shall not be enforceable until signed by both parties and approved by the Office of the County Attorney.

<u>Section 5.17. COUNTERPARTS</u>: This Agreement may be executed simultaneously in several counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

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

APPROVAL/RESOLUTION ADVOCATING AGAINST OSHA REFORMS IN NEW YORK STATE FOR FIREFIGHTERS

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam is the home to 13 all-volunteer fire companies, that have served the County and its towns and villages faithfully for decades; and

WHEREAS, the personnel of these companies form the backbone of our emergency response apparatus, tirelessly working to ensure the safety, security, and well-being of our residents, often at great personal sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam acknowledges, with gratitude, the commendable efforts of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in initiating measures aimed at enhancing the safety and welfare of our invaluable emergency responders; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the strides made in bolstering emergency responder safety, the County of Putnam harbors legitimate concerns regarding the future accessibility, affordability, and efficacy of emergency services within our jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, OSHA has published significant changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156, the Fire Brigades Standard, on February 5, 2024, converting the current Fire Brigades Standard to the proposed Emergency Response Standard, which has the potential to dramatically change the face of the fire service in the United States, the State of New York, and the County of Putnam; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam has serious concerns that the proposed changes will have major implications for every firefighter in the County of Putnam through unfunded mandates and possible fines for noncompliance, along with the imposition of additional liabilities upon fire service organizations and municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam believes the proposed changes are not economically and technically feasible for the volunteer fire service in present form and will cause our volunteer fire departments significant financial burden and hardships through increased costs for administration, training, equipment inspection and replacement, and facility renovations; and

WHEREAS, the County of Putnam believes the best service to taxpayers and the fire service community at large is for OSHA to start this rule making process over from the beginning; and

WHEREAS, this matter has been duly considered by the Legislature of the County of Putnam and the Putnam County Executive; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the County of Putnam, mindful of its responsibility to safeguard the interests and welfare of its residents, hereby expresses its reservations to the proposed changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156 and respectfully requests that OSHA, in conjunction with our state and national officials, give due consideration to the following:

- 1. Extend the public comment period beyond the deadline of July 22, 2024, so all fire service organizations and governmental bodies have adequate time to review the 608 page document and formulate comprehensive, fact based comments;
- 2. OSHA and the Congress of the United States of America should hold inperson public hearings on the proposed changes;
- 3. Remove the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards (Twenty-one (21) being incorporated in whole or in part, and fourteen (14) other standards contributing to new requirements to varying degrees) from the proposed rule and continue these standards as voluntary consensus standards;
- 4. Reevaluate the intended audience and scope of the standard to accommodate the varying regulatory frameworks and classifications of volunteer firefighters across different states, ensuring equitable treatment and compliance with applicable laws and regulations;
- 5. Transform the proposed standard into a dynamic, adaptive "living document" capable of evolving in tandem with emerging national needs, technological advancements, and best practices, thereby obviating the need for periodic overhauls and updates to address obsolescence and inefficiency;
- 6. Identify and prioritize additional safety measures and protocols that can be expeditiously implemented with minimal resource expenditure and manpower requirements, thereby augmenting the resilience and effectiveness of our emergency response infrastructure;

- 7. Collaborate closely with stakeholders to develop a standardized framework that strikes a judicious balance between economic feasibility and technical efficacy, thereby ensuring the sustainability and viability of our emergency response initiatives in the long run;
- 8. OSHA should provide clear definitions of "volunteer" and "employee" factoring in the various definitions found in the first responder community across the country to provide consistency in implementation of the proposed rule;
- 9. OSHA should start the rule making process on 1910.156 over giving the volunteer fire service who provide sixty-five (65) percent of firefighting services in the United States a formal seat at the rule making table;
- 10. Significant changes to OSHA Rule 1910.156, the Fire Brigade Standard, should be phased in over time to allow fire companies to come into compliance and to budget for the fiscal impacts caused by the changes; and be it further

RESOLVED, that Clerk of the Legislature is directed to forward copies of this resolution to OSHA, United States Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, United States Representative Michael Lawler, Governor Kathy Hochul, Senator Peter Harckham, Assembly Members Matthew Slater and Dana Levenberg, and any others deemed necessary and proper.


